Use public transport or taxis exclusively—never drink and drive under any circumstances

- Bring cash as well as cards—some traditional pubs remain cash-only establishments
- Allow time between venues to appreciate each pub's unique character and atmosphere
- Engage with locals and bartenders for insider recommendations on hidden gems
- Try regional specialities—each area has signature drinks and dishes worth sampling
- Be mindful of Scottish licensing hours, which can vary by establishment and location
