

Anstruther

A bustling harbour town famous for its fresh seafood and maritime museum. Watch fishing boats return with their daily catch and enjoy the lively waterfront atmosphere.

 **Historic Connection:** Lower Largo is the birthplace of Alexander Selkirk, the real-life inspiration for Robinson Crusoe, with nearby ancient standing stones to explore.

Fife Coastal Path

By Car

Fife is easily accessible via the impressive Forth Road and Rail Bridges from Edinburgh and the central belt of Scotland. The journey offers stunning views across the Firth of Forth. Driving within Fife allows flexibility to explore hidden villages and coastal routes.



Public Transport

Regular train and bus services connect major towns like St Andrews, Kirkcaldy, and Dunfermline with Edinburgh and beyond. The rail network provides comfortable, scenic journeys with frequent departures throughout the day.




Cycling Routes
